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

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

Kansas Geological Society (KGS) Medallion for Scientific Distinction and Excellence

The Kansas Geological Society (KGS) Medallion for Scientific Distinction and Excellence may be given annually for peer-recognized, sustained significant scientific contributions to all facets of applied Kansas geology, including work either in Kansas or in surrounding states if the latter contributions pertain directly and significantly to Kansas geology. No more than one award may be given each year, an award does not have to be given every year, and members of the KGS Awards Committee that handle nominations for this award cannot nominate themselves for this award. The candidates need not be active KGS members, and they must be living at the time of selection. The primary consideration in the selection of a candidate shall be his or her sustained, published, significant contributions to any facet of Kansas geology. Contributions may be varied in form such as development of geologic concepts, advancement in discovery thinking, and recognized leadership in exploration concepts. Oral and/or written publications in peer-reviewed geological venues is a requisite criterion for any candidate for this award. The name of a candidate shall be presented by the Awards Committee to the KGS Board of Directors for their approval. Once approved, the recipient shall be presented an appropriate award in the form of a medallion or plaque recommended by the Awards Committee and approved by the Board of Directors at the annual business meeting of the society.

In a unanimous vote, the committee recommended that the first recipient of this award be **Dr. Lynn Watney.**

At the request of Paul Ramondetta, KGS President, the Awards Committee members are Sal Mazzullo, Mike Dealy and Alfred James.

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
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

2017 AAPG Mid-Continent Section Meeting

The 2017 AAPG Mid-Continent Section Meeting was held in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma September 30th through October 3, 2017. Final attendance is not in yet, but well over 700 were registered with over 125 of these being students. The Wichita oil community was well represented with over 17 geologists including Alan Banta, Bryce Bidleman, Beth Isern, Aaron Young, Wes Hansen, Gerry Honas, Alan DeGood and his wife Dianne, Doug Davis, Larry Richardson and his wife Linda, Ernie Morrison and his wife Pat, Dave Clothier and his wife Marty, Paul Ramondetta and his wife Joanna, Brian Fischer and Kevin Davis.

The Meeting kicked off with an awards ceremony and ice breaker in the exhibit area. The exhibit area consisted of over 50 booths with a variety of exhibitors such as Paragon Geophysical Services, Schlumberger Service, Fort Hays State University and the Kansas Geological Society and Library manned by Angela Forrest.

At the back of the exhibition hall, there were poster exhibits that changed each day. As you would expect, University of Oklahoma and Oklahoma State University had as strong presence. Kansas was well represented also with posters from Kansas State University and the Kansas Geological Survey in conjunction with Kansas University. Dr. Tandis Bidgoli, Kansas Geological Survey, was involved in several posters and had a contingent of students from Kansas University. It should be noted that Dr. Hendratti Ali from Fort Hays State University had several students with her that attended the convention and manned the Fort Hays State University Booth. Wichita State also had students attending the convention.

The workshops prior to the start of the convention were interesting and the technical sessions or talks had something for everyone. The sessions ranged from "Learning from the SCOOP & STACK' to "Mid-Continent Conventional Plays".

For those of us unfamiliar with the acronyms SCOOP and STACK, they refer to the hottest plays in Oklahoma at this time. SCOOP is a term coined by Continental Resources and refers to <u>South Central Oklahoma Oil Province</u>. This is a play taking advantage of older production by developing the resource with horizontal drilling. STACK is a play just North of the SCOOP play and refers to <u>Sooner Trend Anadarko</u> (Basin) <u>Canadian and Kingfisher</u> (Counties).

On Monday morning, there was a House of Delegates breakfast meeting to discuss the future of AAPG and outlining a business model to survive a slower steady oil business. AAPG continues to be a leader in scientific research and information on the art of discovering oil and gas.

On Tuesday morning, the Mid-Continent Section held a meeting where officers were elected for a twoyear term. Their term will change or end at the next Mid-Continent Meeting in Wichita in the fall of 2019. The Officers for the upcoming term are: Doug Davis: President, Jamie Woolsey: Vice President, Nathan Randolph: Secretary, Mike Allison: Treasurer and HW 'Dub' Peace becomes Past President.

In October of 2018 (12th-14th), the AAPG Mid-Continent Section will hold a Field Conference entitled: New Insights into Carboniferous Cyclothems" This field trip will give petroleum geologists that search for oil in Kansas a chance to see the petroleum reservoirs in outcrop.

If you missed this convention, you missed a very well organized and informative event. Thomas Cronin, General Chair and Terry Hollrah, Vice Chair, along with all the committees and volunteers put on an excellent event.

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Memorial Marvin Frankamp

Marvin E. Frankamp January 16, 1927 – July 12, 2017

Marvin was born in Scottsville, Kansas, the second child of Ernest and Daisy Frankamp. He was raised on a 400 acre farm near Scottsville, along with his four brothers and a sister. Marvin and his siblings loved living on the farm and spent what seemed like a good portion of their adulthoods telling anyone who would listen about their adventures as kids. Actually, there didn't even need to be anyone there to listen. We have an old home video, taken at a family reunion about 25 years ago, that shows the six of them holding court. At first, the room is filled with spouses, children and grandchildren, and many chuckles are provided. As time goes on, their audience gradually wanders off, but the camera keeps rolling. Long before the tape reaches the end of the reel, it is just the six of them, telling their stories to each other! Marvin and his brothers and sister attended a country schoolhouse, with grades 1 through 8 all in one room, where each kid brought something to contribute to the daily potluck lunch. He graduated from Scottsville High School in 1944, part of a graduating class of 4. In fact, there were only 5 boys in the whole school, which he always said was the only reason he made the basketball team.

After high school, he and his Dad and his older brother Gene made a deal – Marvin would go to college while Gene stayed to help on the farm. Then they would switch. But Gene got drafted, and Marvin had to come back to the farm after a short stint at Sterling College. Then Marvin got drafted in October of 1945. The war had just ended, but he spent 2 years at Fort Richardson near Anchorage, Alaska.

After his discharge, he attended the College of Emporia, later transferring to Kansas State, where he earned a bachelor's degree in Geology in 1952. Marvin married Rosalie Anstaett in 1950, and they remained together for 67 years. They raised four children, two boys and two girls.

Marvin's geology career began in the field as an acid truck driver for Dowell, then he took a pay cut to accept a geologist position with Bishop Oil Company, a tenure that lasted 2 years. After that he worked on his own, buying leases and turning deals on the arch. In the early 1960s, he and Art Deaver with Edmiston Oil bought an oil reclaiming facility south of Great Bend. Marvin moved his family there to run the operation and supplemented that income by sitting on wells.

In 1963, with oil at about \$3 a barrel, he returned to school and earned a degree in education from WSU. He taught 7th grade science for 10 years in the Derby and Wichita school districts. With four hungry kids, he had to work second and third jobs to keep food on the table. This primarily consisted of repairing and painting houses after school, weekends, and summers. In 1968, Marvin bought the horse operation at Wagon Wheel Ranch which is located east of Wichita near Santa Fe Lake. The operation consisted of a large stable that boarded horses for a monthly fee, and a string of horses that were used for trail rides. We logged many hundreds of miles in the saddle that year, leading the city slickers around the property. He also built a "pony-go-round", an elegant contraption kind of like they use to exercise thoroughbreds. It would all pack into a small trailer, but then assemble into a 30-foot diameter merry-go-round, to which 6 ponies were attached. We would take it to grade school fun nights, put the little kids on the ponies, and they would walk in endless circles. It was quite a popular ride.

After the first oil embargo in 1973, Marvin got back into the oil business. He worked for Tomlinson Oil for a couple of years before founding North American Drilling and Exploration with a couple of partners from Little River, Kansas. Marvin concentrated his explorations efforts in Barton, Rice, Stafford and Edwards counties and the company was successful in finding some nice wells. During this time, Marvin bought a ten acre "ranchette" out west of Wichita, and he finally got to return to country living like he had always wanted to do. He built a big barn, bought a couple of horses and a couple of ponies, and planted a few acres in alfalfa for them. He and Rosalie joined the Carriage Club and he built a horse drawn wagon

that they would drive around in parades and such. He loved it out there, but as he approached his 70s it became a little too much to maintain and they moved back into town.

He built a big shop behind their new house. He loved puttering around in there. He was a welder and a woodworker and an artist. He could build anything from scratch. A miniature working carousel, a ZTR mower, waterwheels, a grandfather clock, furniture, wooden toys, and many horse sculptures. His most popular toy was a wooden catapult that launched rubber balls across the room. He made literally hundreds of them over the years and donated them to the Lake Afton Boys Home, Wichita Children's Home, etc.

In the late 1990s, he sold out of North American and began generating his own prospects. He continued to find success turning deals to several Kansas operators. He liked going to coffee with his buddies, or lunch at the linoleum club, where they would tell bad jokes and tall tales and solve the world's problems. He loved the oil business. Even at the very end, he kept asking me if I wanted to share a Red Top subscription, because he needed to find another washdown!


Marvin's passions were his family, first and foremost, and woodworking, horses, inventing things and serving the Church with his time and talents. He and Rosalie attended nearly every single one of their sons' and grandsons' sporting events. He especially enjoyed following the progress of his grandson Conner.

But most of all, he loved people. He and Will Rogers still haven't met a man they didn't like. When his mobility got worse, and he was using a walker, it was scary because he never looked at where he was going.

His head was always up looking to see if there was someone to say Hi to.

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

Grants to help with research on Kansas related geology are also considered for aid.


Currently, the Foundation has four students working on well log integration: Kyle Lawson, Helen Cruz, Shuyao Li (a.k.a. Emily) and David Bruce. They work between ten and thirty hours per week. More than a dozen other part-time integrators have worked on the project since 2010.

Between 2011 and 2016, the integration project compared 131,811 well logs to holdings on Walters Digital Library (WDL). Of these, 45,814 (34.8%) were not in WDL and were subsequently added to the library hold-ings. Additionally, 1,173 of the donated logs were re-scanned to replace poor images on WDL.

In the first seven months of 2017, 7,210 donated logs were compared to WDL. 1,110 (15.4%) new logs were added to WDL, with 263 rescans. Funding donated to the Foundation by the Society for increasing integrators' hours has greatly increased production. Thank you!"



Exploration Highlights

1.) K-T Oil Exploration & Leasing Company, Hoxie (KS), has discovered Lansing-Kansas City oil deposits at their #1 South of the Border well in Rawlins County. The new unnamed pool discovery well is producing 10 bbls or oil and 15 bbls of water daily at site located in the NE/4 of section 6- T1s- R31W, about six miles north and three miles west of the town of Herndon. The well is producing crude from perforations between 4154 to 4158 ft. Discovery Drilling tools drilled the well to a total depth of 4220 ft. The new deposits were found nearly three miles north of the Sattler Field, which was discovered by Credo Petroleum Corporation in mid-2010, and also produced oil from a single LKC zone.

2.) Phillips Exploration Company LC, Andover (KS), is producing 50 bbls of oil and 1 bbl of water per day at the #1-4-SHR Wanker - a remote wildcat well located almost five miles from other known production in Trego County. The new unnamed pool discovery is producing crude from the Lansing-Kansas City formation from 3893 to 3904 ft. Total depth was obtained at 4450 ft. with Murfin Drilling tools. Wellsite lies in the SE/4 of section 4- T13s- R24W, about five miles south and five miles west of Wakeeney, Kansas.

3.) Eagle Creek Corporation, Wichita (KS), has stepped-out nearly one mile northeast of known oil production in the White Woman North Field (1997) to discover new oil reserves in the Marmaton formation. The #1-24 Johnson - Rapier, spotted in the SW/4 of section 24- T20s-

R35W, Wichita County, was drilled to a logger's total depth of 4702 ft at site thirteen miles south and four miles east of Marienthal, Kansas. Completion details are currently being held confidential. The new oil field has not been named.

4.) Jason Oil Company LLC, Russell (KS), has opened a new unnamed oil field in Ellis County with the completion of the #1 Hoffman. The discovery well was drilled to a total depth around 3800 ft with rotary rig furnished by WW Drilling. The wildcat well is producing an undisclosed amount of oil from the Lansing-Kansas City formation. Field area is situated about one mile northeast of established production in the Degenhart Southeast Field (1957), where the LKC and Arbuckle formations have given up reserves. The town of Pfeifer, Kansas lies two miles south and one-half mile east of the new discovery.

5.) Lario Oil & Gas Company, Wichita (KS), has discovered new Marmaton (Pawnee) oil reserves at the #1-4 Knobbe in Wichita County. The wildcat pool opener was drilled by Southwind Drilling tools in the NE/4 of section 4- T19s- R37W. Total depth was reached at 5000 ft. The well is currently pump testing at location about three miles south and two miles west of Leoti, Kansas. Completion information is being held confidential. Operator selected a very remote drill site that lies over nine miles northwest of the Rees Ranch Northwest oil field (2014, Marmaton oil). the new oil field has not been named.

6.) Murfin Drilling Company, Wichita (KS), has established new oil production at a wildcat well in Rawlins County. The discovery of oil deposits in the Lansing-Kansas City formation was made at the #1-14 Kopriva in the NW/4 of section 14- T2s- R35W. Company tools were used to bottom the well at a total depth of 4855 ft. Discovery site is located almost two miles southwest of another recent Murfin discovery, #1-7 Haller (section 7- T2s-R34W), which was completed earlier this year as a Lansing-Kansas City oil producer and thus established the Kopriva Northeast Field. The new Kopriva discovery well is situated four miles north of the town of Beardsley, Kansas.
